SWEEP DREAMS ARE MADE OF THIS – TRY WHEELCHAIR CURLING

Looking for something fun, social, and inclusive to do this winter? Wheelchair curling is the perfect mix of challenge, strategy, and community — no experience needed!

Why Give It a Try?

It's fun and social

Challenge yourself, meet great people, and join the group at the bar after practice!

It's inclusive

Players use both manual and power chairs, and everyone's welcome — no matter your experience level.

Play your way

Curl for fun or compete! We send teams to provincial and national championships every year, and power chair users are encouraged to join.

It's affordable

Try it for free, and if you love it, it's just \$50 for the season — equipment included.

How It Works

In wheelchair curling, players deliver rocks from a stationary position using a delivery stick — no sweeping required! The goal is to curl your rock into the rings ("the house") to score points or knock out your opponent's rocks.

We play three fun formats:

Team Curling (4 players) – the classic version, about 2 hours long.

Stick Curling (2 players) – a quicker 1-hour game where wheelchair curlers are highly competitive.

Mixed Doubles – like stick curling, with pre-set rocks and mixed-gender teams.

From July 7–9, 2025, I had the incredible opportunity to compete at the US Adaptive Open held at Woodmont Country Club in Rockville, Maryland.

I qualified for the event back in May, after travelling to California where I finished as low medalist with a score of –2. That performance earned me a direct spot into last week's tournament.

This past week, I was proud to capture the title of Top Medalist in the Upper Limb Category, posting rounds of 71, 75, and 69 (–1) — winning the division by seven shots.

Overall, I finished 7th place in the full field of 96 of the world's best adaptive golfers and was also the top Canadian in the event.

With the win, I've earned an exemption into next year's US Adaptive Open as well as valuable WR4GD world ranking points.

I want to extend a heartfelt thank you to AASRA for the continued support over the years. My success on the course is directly tied to the incredible financial and community support I've received through AASRA — it's what allows me to chase these dreams and turn them into reality.

My Experience on the G4D Tour – Recap from Vic McClelland







I was very fortunate to play in two G4D Tour Net events this year after starting the season ranked #2 in the World Disabled Golfers Net Rankings.

G4D Tour @ Betfred British Masters

I had the incredible opportunity to attend the 2025 Betfred British Masters, hosted by the DP World Tour and EDGA for Net players. The event was held at The Belfry Golf Resort just outside Birmingham, England — on the legendary Brabazon Course, which has hosted four Ryder Cups.

We played two days before the DP World Tour's Nick Faldo Masters. The course was set up for tour play — 6,450 meters long, with fast greens and deep rough. It was a real test! Day one was

a tough start, finishing 11 over my net, but day two went much better — 4 over — placing me 7th overall.

The resort and the Tour staff treated us exceptionally well, and for any golfer, playing a DP World Tour setup was a true bucket list experience. The final day included a special 40th Anniversary Ryder Cup match, where I got to watch Nick Faldo and Luke Donald (this year's Ryder Cup Captain) in action — an unforgettable highlight.

G4D Tour @ FedEx Open de France

My second event was held in France before the FedEx Open de France. The course was another long, challenging layout set up for the Tour. Weather conditions were tough — cool and rainy through the first round — but I was lucky to have my caddie along for support. The event was moved from Le Golf National (under renovation) to Golf de Saint-Nom-La-Bretèche, which featured several blind tee shots and doglegs. Missing fairways came with a price, and my scoring showed it until the final nine holes of day two, where I shot three under my handicap — just a bit too late. I finished 8th overall.

Although I'm not sure I'll get the chance to play in events like this again, it was absolutely worth the travel, the long hours, and the lost sleep. Both tournaments were incredible experiences that I'll always remember.
